This Month's Spotlight

Dr. Milan Milenovic

Post-doctorate Researcher in the Department of Microbiology and Plant Pathology



We interviewed Dr. Milan Milenovic, who will be speaking at the International Scholars Meet & Greet on August 28th! Follow his story below.

Please tell us a little bit about your background (before coming to UCR).

I was born and raised in Serbia (Yugoslavia at the time) where I lived until I finished my bachelor's degree. Having a strong interest in biology and specifically plants, I studied crop protection at the Faculty of Agriculture in the University of Belgrade. Midway through the studies, I applied for an exchange program with the University of Minnesota which marked my first international experience. I loved the experience of spending a year in a multicultural environment and exploring new places and cultures. I finished my bachelor's in Serbia but wanted more, both in terms of science and traveling. I enrolled in a double degree master's program at the University of Copenhagen, Denmark and University of Catania, Italy, an incredible program which culminated with a 6-month master research project in Tanzania. A year of freelancing later, I moved to Luxembourg to pursue a doctoral degree. My constant pursuit of experiences and knowledge eventually brought me back to the US where my scientific journey began—this time to the warm state of California.

Please briefly describe your role at UCR.

I am a postdoctoral researcher at the Department of Microbiology and Plant Pathology, in the team of Prof. Howard Judelson. I work on a plant pathogen Phytophthora infestans, a fungal-like microorganism that causes late blight disease, primarily important in potato and tomato production. My project focuses on the effect of ploidy level on the biology of the organism, and the genetic basis of the mating types.

How did you get into molecular biology?

I was always intrigued with how life works at the tiniest scale. Following my master studies, I decided to pursue a PhD with a project that had a strong molecular biology component to it. I liked that part of the project the most, so decided to double down on it and apply for a postdoc position which would further expand my knowledge in molecular biology and bioinformatics. Today, a year later I see that it was the right choice!

What have been some challenges that you have faced since coming to the US?

Even with prior international experiences under my belt, adapting to a new culture, work environment, and settling down is a challenge. In particular, 10 years ago when I studied in the US as an undergraduate everything was simpler and handled by World Learning, my sponsoring organization at the time. This time around, my wife and I were on our own to navigate the murky waters of visa paperwork, postdoc contract paperwork, health insurance paperwork, car paperwork, paperwork, paperwork. All relatively simple when looked individually, but taken together, quite overwhelming. However, with the great support of the international office, my PI, colleagues and friends, everything went very well.

What are some of your favorite memories at UCR?

International scholar coffee hour every Friday and all the amazing people from all over the world that I met there!

FAQs for International Scholars

I need to leave the U.S. and ISS has not signed my DS-2019 document! Is that OK? Please know that you do not need a travel signature on your DS-2019 document to either remain in or to depart the U.S. You do need a valid travel signature to return to the U.S. in J-1 status. A valid travel signature must be no more than twelve months old on the date that you return to the U.S. If you are departing the U.S. soon and know that your travel signature will expire by the time you expect to return to the U.S., please contact our international scholar advisor at makbule.koksal@ucr.edu. If your DS-2019 is going to expire soon, please consult with your department to extend your stay and then contact our scholar advisor.

What will happen if I end my UCR appointment early and/or depart the United States and do not intend to return to the U.S. for my J program?

If you are a scholar and you depart the U.S. early (more than 15 days before your DS-2019 end date) and you do not intend to return to the U.S. for the remainder of your J program, please discuss this with your faculty sponsor. Please also email our advisor so that she can advise you on the steps and the visa implications of ending your program early.
